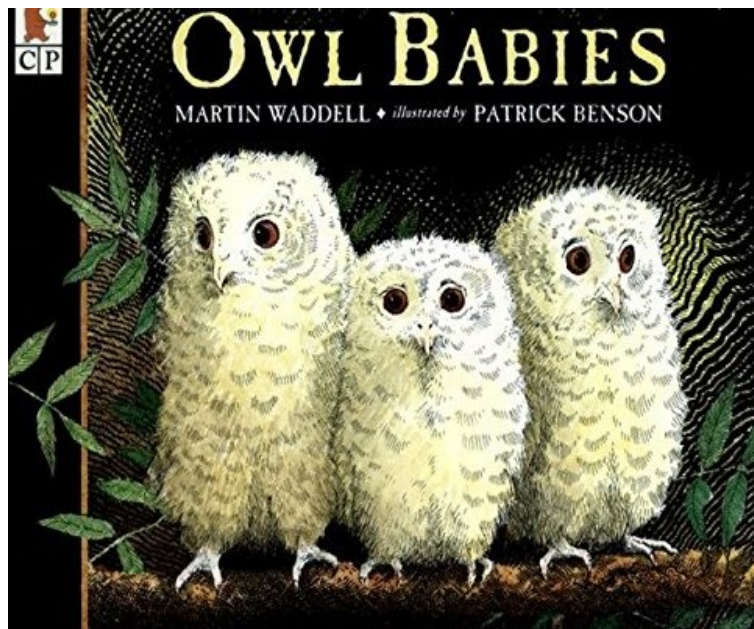




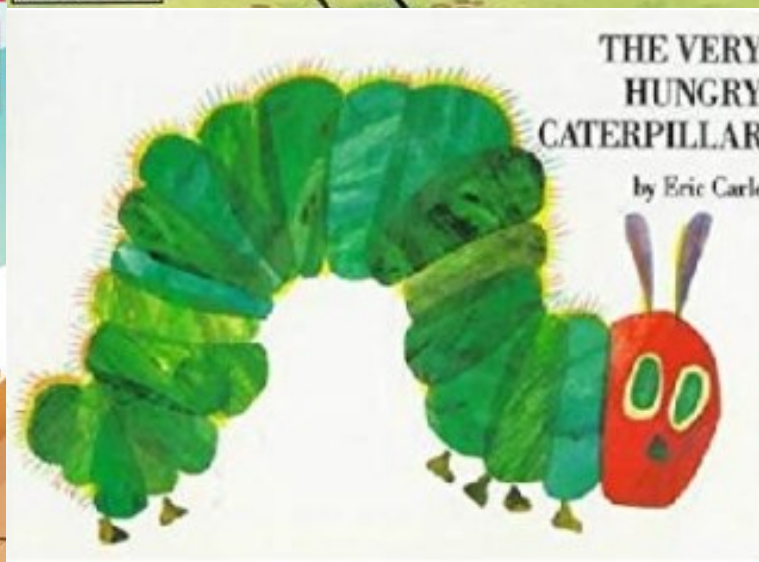
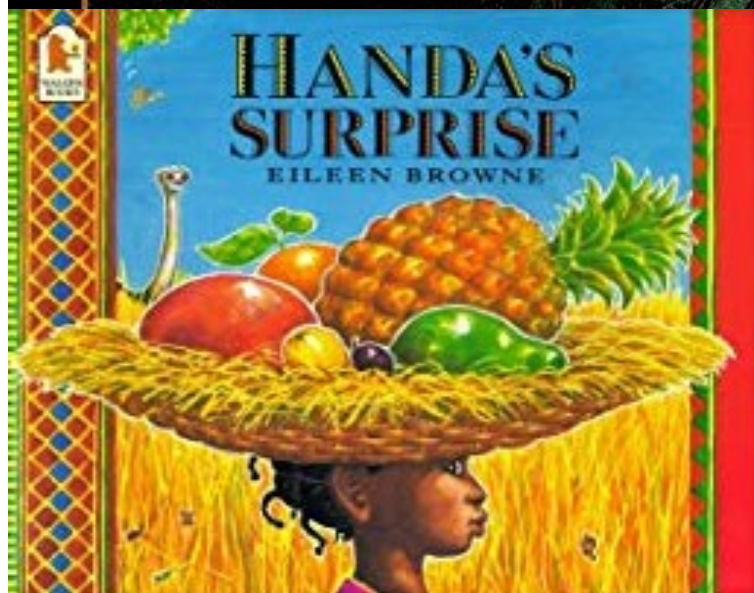

Notes on the Curriculum and Progression

The foundation stage curriculum utilises novel study as part of a range of strategies to develop children's English skills. The novel studies are combined with writing about real experiences, continuous provision and RWI to enable children to meet or exceed the early learning goals.

The foundation stage moves progressively through the banding of the development matters. The curriculum will facilitate children's development, from 30-50 months through to being prepared to access the national curriculum in year one.

The books they study provide a variety of story types appropriate to children in EYFS, allowing them to empathise with character's, discuss their reading and develop vocabulary. Children also develop their writing skills through both real and experiences and responses to the stories in the curriculum.
